



My name is William Vincent, I am the new USS Cusk SSG 348 Newsletter editor. A little bit about me.

I joined the Navy in June of 1953 after graduating from San Mateo High School. After completing bootcamp, I was assigned to the U. S. S. Essex (CVA-9). In October 1953, we deployed to West Pac, returned in May of 1954. Korea was still official but all was quiet. We returned to West Pac in September. In April of 1955, I had the opportunity to volunteer for submarine duty. It was the dream of a life time. I left the Essex in Sasbo, Japan and came home for 14 days leave than reported to San Diego for my sub physical and evaluation. After I was accepted for submarine duty, I was assigned to the USS Cusk (SS 348) stationed in Port Hueneme. We were one of the submarines that were developing the Regulus missile system. I was assigned to the auxiliary gang. I qualified in July of 1956. In September we went to Mare Island for an overhaul. We left Mare Island in February of 1957. We took a trip to Alaska to test the ship after overhaul. After Alaska we had our homeport changed to Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. In June, 1957 I was discharged. My boat name was "Vinnie the vulch."

When I enlisted in the Navy, I came in what was called a 4x8 program, which meant that I served 4 years active and 4 years in the reserve. I did not have to drill at this time.

I started college in September of 1957. In January of 1958, I decided to affiliate with the active reserve (I needed the money). The first unit I drilled in was Sub Div. 12-31 at Hunters Point. A lot of the people that are now in the Mare Island Base were in that unit and the ones we merged into.

In June of 1961 I was graduated from college and my hitch was up from reserve. Here I was, no job, no money, no nothing. Jobs were hard to come by at that time so in January of 1962, I signed up with the reserve. I put in 31 years plus 4 active ones for a total of 35 years. I retired from the reserve in February 1989.

I landed a job with Lockheed Missiles & Space Co. in Sunnyvale. I had gone to college to become an artist. The job I landed at Lockheed was in the Technical Publications Department. In the 35+ years I was at Lockheed, I worked on all types of art, publications, and presentation material—originally hand drawn but later moving to very sophisticated computer platforms.

I retired in February of 1998. It was a great ride. Along the way, I got married, had a couple of kids, and got divorced. I have two kids, one step child, and three grandchildren. I have a lady, who has put up with me for 23+ years. She is my best friend, my buddy, and everything else.

In September of 1998, while on a Cusk reunion, I was introduced to USSVI. I joined the San Diego Base of USSVI in 1999. Shortly, I got a call from Lon Schmidt D-10 Commander and an old shipmate wanting to know why I was in San Diego Base and not in Mare Island Base. I told him I did not know that there was a base in Vallejo, but that I would transfer. In August I became the editor of the base news-

letter, of which I renamed the Pump Room. I am still the editor.

In 2003 I became a charter member of the Dolphin Base in San Jose, CA. I assumed the office of treasurer for the base. I also had a hand in the design of the base logo.
